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

Program overview

Program overview

The Australian Government has committed \$100 million from 2024-25 to 2028-29 to the new national Active Transport Fund.

This program aims to provide funding for new and upgraded bicycle and walking paths across Australia to encourage an increase in active transport use.

This supports the Australian Government's commitment to safe and accessible active transport options.

Program overview

Applications for funding will need to address one or more of the below active transport priorities, which include:

- Creating a safer environment for cyclists and pedestrians
- Supporting zero emissions travel

- Promoting active and liveable communities


Eligibility and funding



Eligibility criteria



Who is eligible to apply?



Applications can only be made by state and territory governments, and local government authorities (LGAs).

Applications in partnership with other parties must have a lead applicant from a state and territory government, or a local government authority.

What are eligible projects?



Eligible projects must:

- Be for the upgrade of an existing or construction of a new bicycle or walking pathway
- Directly address at least one focus area, and be supported by evidence
- Be located on a publicly owned road asset or road corridor that is accessible to the public
- Be a whole and complete project (not reliant on other works)

Focus areas for eligible projects



Focus areas	Summary of objectives*
Road safety	To improve road safety and reduce road trauma
	for cyclists and pedestrians.
Reduce	To support commuters to choose more efficient,
transport	healthy, affordable and sustainable modes of
emissions	transport, including walking and cycling.
Active and	To invest in projects which better connect
liveable	people and where they live and work, reduce
communities	traffic-related air and noise pollution, promote
	outdoor physical activity, while also providing
	better opportunities in lower socio-economic
	areas.


Eligible and ineligible project costs



Eligible project costs are limited to 'approved purposes' of a funded project.

Funding eligibility



- Up to a maximum of \$5 million of Australian
 Government funding from the program for each eligible project
- Funding co-contribution is required
- For projects submitted by state and territory governments, the program will contribute up to 50% of the total project cost, regardless of project location
- For projects submitted by LGAs, an alternative funding co-contribution can be sought, providing the need for an alternative arrangement is justified in the application

Project delivery timeframes



Delivery milestone	Construction only projects	Design and construction projects
To complete design	Not applicable	Within 12 months of the funding offer being approved
To commence construction	Within 12 months of the funding offer being approved	Within 24 months of the funding offer being approved
To complete construction	Within 36 months of the funding offer being approved	Within 48 months of the funding offer being approved

An acceptable Post Completion Report must be provided within three months of completion of construction for each project.

Unforeseen factors such as adverse weather events: Flexibility to vary the timeframe for a project, up to 31 December 2028 subject to agreement by the department.

All projects must be physically and financially completed by 30 June 2029.

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Application process



How to apply

1. Check eligibility

- Review the eligibility criteria in the guidelines.
- Use the eligibility checklist in the application form.

2. Prepare application

- Complete the application form addressing all relevant assessment criteria.
- Include all information and documentation that may assist with the assessment of the application.
- Include all mandatory evidence (see Section 3.2 of the guidelines).

3. Submit application

- Submit the application form through the Department's online portal, IMS¹.
- Applications close 13 January 2025 at 11:59pm (AEDT)

Assessment Criteria

Criterion 1: Strategic fit

Outline the rationale for the project, why there is a strong case for action, how it will achieve the stated objectives, and how it meets the needs of the community.

Criterion 2: Project impact and benefits

Demonstrate the road safety, social, economic and environmental value of the project with supporting evidence-based analysis. This includes direct project benefits as well as benefits during the construction of the project.

Criterion 3: Project deliverability

Demonstrate the capability and capacity to deliver the project, including mitigating identified risks.

Attach evidence to support your responses to the criteria in your application.

Mandatory attachments

Applications that do not include mandatory attachments cannot be assessed and will be deemed ineligible.

Evidence must be provided to demonstrate that co-contribution funding for the project has been secured prior to submitting an application. Examples of acceptable co-contribution evidence include official letters and budget papers.

Applications must include evidence to support how a project addresses one or more Focus Areas and their relevant target areas as specified in section 2.2.2 of the guidelines. Examples of focus area supporting evidence is as follows:

- Safety plans, road safety audits and infrastructure asset reports
- Existing Net Zero plans or strategies
- Analysis that shows the project will increase cyclist or pedestrian numbers, increase use of public transport or remove cars from roads
- Active Transport Strategies
- Urban Strategies to connect communities and increase liveability

Assessment process

The program is an application-based, merit-assessed funding program.

Applications opened on 31 October 2024 and close 13 January 2025 at 11:59pm (AEDT).

The department will review all applications against the eligibility criteria, including which focus area it addresses.

The department will consider each application on its merits, based on:

- how well it meets the assessment criteria
- how it compares to other applications
- whether it provides value of relevant money.

The department will recommend the highest scoring projects to the Minister for approval. Following the Minister's decision, the department will contact applicants to advise of the outcome of their application.

Applicants with unsuccessful applications will be offered feedback.

Information for successful applicants



Information for successful applicants – The Funding Offer

- Project is approved, then successful applicant receives funding offer.
- Funding offer signed by proponent and returned to the department <u>within 30</u>
 <u>calendar days</u>.
- Funding offers with LGA proponents will be shared with their relevant state or territory government agency to assist with the management of project payments (see section 5.3 of the guidelines).
- Payments will be made on the achievement of milestones according to the milestone schedule in the funding offer.
- Proponents are required to provide quarterly reports in February, May, August and November on the status of their project(s).
- Any variations must be agreed to by the department.

Frequently Asked Questions



Definition of a pathway

Projects under the Active Transport Fund are administered by the National Land Transport Act (the NLT Act).

The NLT Act states a pathway is a road-based asset as defined in section 4(1) Road of the NLT Act and the National Land Transport Regulations 2022.

To be eligible under the program, projects must be within a public road corridor or on a public road asset.

The program is unable to fund projects for pathways that are bush walking trails etc in protected or urban areas, unless these trails are alongside a publicly owned road asset or road corridor.

For example, we cannot fund walking and cycling paths along rail corridors, through the bush, or parks or around lakes etc where there are not any roads.

A public road corridor is considered to be the area alongside the public road asset. This corridor may differ for each road asset, and would be for the applicant to determine suitable locations.

LGAs alternative funding

LGAs may seek alternative funding contributions as part of their application.

LGAs who are unable to meet the 50% co-funding contribution may request a funding contribution from the Australian Government greater than 50%.

Where this additional government funding is sought, justification must be provided by the LGA to demonstrate the need for this additional funding arrangement.

The justification would be very specific to your circumstances and could relate to a range of matters such as budget constraints, significant cost of specific work, benefit to the community etc.

Crossings

The crossing would need to link pathways that people have to access as part of a longer journey to get to or from school/home etc, and you would need to demonstrate that it would encourage active transport by providing the crossing.

However, the crossing would not be considered eligible if its purpose is just for getting people across to the other side of the road, without the connection to a longer pathway.

Example of an eligible crossing: one that links two parts of a continuous bike path that weaves through a suburb

Example of an ineligible crossing: one in the middle of a main street that solely facilitates movement across the road and back for shopping trips or access to services
